Poinsettias, native to Mexico, have deep ties to San Diego. Introduced to the U.S. in 1828 by Joel Roberts Poinsett, the first U.S. ambassador to Mexico, they became a commercial success thanks to Paul Ecke Sr., who moved his business to Encinitas in the 1920s. Ecke's innovations made San Diego the top supplier of poinsettias, once providing over 90% of the U.S. market. Today, the Ecke Ranch continues to give back as a nonprofit farm.

Roasted Brussels Sprouts with Pomegranates and Pecans. <u>Recipe Link</u>

This dish is bursting with festive holiday flavor. Roasted brussels sprouts are sweet and nutty. The outside is golden brown with a soft interior. Tossing sprouts with toasted pecans and tangy pomegranate seeds adds texture and brightness. The pomegranate glaze adds a sweet finish to the dish.



Brussels sprouts are in season in fall and winter. They are widely available in grocery stores and local farmers markets. Select sprouts that feel heavy for their size and are bright green. The leaves should cling tightly to the heads. Aim for sprouts similar in size so that they cook evenly. The sprouts can be stored in the refrigerator for up to four days. The sooner they are cooked, the better they taste.



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December Gardening Guide:

December Garden To-Do List for Zone 10 (San Diego)

Planting

Cool-Season Vegetables: It's the perfect time to plant seeds **beets**, **carrots**, **lettuce**, **kale**, **spinach**, **Swiss chard**, **radishes**. Plant seedlings cauliflower, cabbage, broccoli. Onions, peas, **Garlic cloves**. **Bare-Root Plants**: Mid-month is ideal for planting bare-root roses, fruit trees, and berries.

Perennials and Herbs: Add long-term staples like **artichokes, asparagus crowns**, and hardy herbs such as parsley, **rosemary, thyme, and oregano**.

Time to buy seed Potatoes Some potato varieties that grow well in San Diego, California's zone 10, include:

Yukon Gem

A mid-season potato that produces yellow-fleshed tubers with pink eyes. They are good for roasting, baking, boiling, and frying.

Red Pontiac

A potato variety that can be cut into quarters or 1.5–2-ounce pieces with an "eye" in each piece.

Russian Banana

A potato variety that needs to be kept covered with at least 6 inches of soil to prevent the tubers from being exposed to sunlight.

Growing Potatoes in containers, buckets or grow bags

Pre Planting Prep: Get seed potatoes for a better harvest.

Put the potatoes in a dark place a week or more, so they start to sprout eyes.

Next, cut the seed potatoes into pieces with at least 2 eyes each. Store pieces at room temperature for 1 to 2 days before planting to allow the cuts to form a callus.

If you are using a bucket or another container make sure there is adequate drainage. Grow bags have drainage. Buy grow bags online.

Soil: Loose soil, a little acidic soil is preferred but, not necessary.

Soil amendment: Add 2 cups of vermicompost to each of the planting bags

Planting: Put about 6 inches of soil in a grow bag. Water the soil.

Place the potato pieces about 6 inches apart. Eyes pointing up. Cover w/3" inch soil.

Add 2 tbsp of liquid fish fertilizer to the large watering can. Water after first planting.

Place in a sunny place to grow.

Watering Schedule: If not raining, water twice a week.

Mounding: As the leafy part of the potato grows to 5-6 inches add straw or shredded paper or even some soil around the stems.

Harvesting: Some harvesting can be done 2 weeks after blooms/ flowers appear. Potatoes are ready to harvest when the vines die back. Usually 100-120 days. Do not wash after harvest. Store in a cool dry place.

Move the sacks outdoors once the weather warms up. Don't allow them to become too hot, as the plants will stop producing tubers if the roots overheat. (Farmers Almanac). - 1. Based on culinary use:
- High-starch: Idaho potatoes. Great for baked potatoes or fried potatoes.
- Medium-starch: Long white potatoes. Excellent baked, fried, or mashed.
- Low-to-medium starch: Yukon gold, yellow potatoes. Great mashed, roasted, baked, soups.
- Low starch and waxy: Round red & round white, new potatoes. Roasted, boiled, salads.

Garden Maintenance

Prune Dormant Plants: Focus on shaping and cleaning up fruit trees, grapevines, and roses (reserve heavy pruning for January). Pest Control: Clear dead leaves and debris to prevent pests from overwintering.

Soil Care: Mulch garden beds to retain moisture and keep soil warm, but avoid fertilizing dormant plants this month.

Smart Watering

Install an automatic irrigation regulator that is monitored by your phone from anywhere in the world. Keep an eye on new plantings to ensure roots don't dry out.

Seasonal Color

Brighten your garden with pansies, violas, calendulas, and snapdragons.

Harvest & Frost Tips

- Citrus Fruits: Harvest ripe lemons, oranges, and grapefruits to lighten the load on branches.
- Frost Protection: Cover tender plants like tomatoes with frost cloth during cold nights, but wait until spring to prune any frost-damaged growth.

Native Plant Seeds and Plants to Plant in December (San Diego, Zone 10)

December is a fantastic time to plant California native seeds and plants in San Diego. The cooler temperatures and winter rains provide ideal conditions for establishment. Here's a guide to native plants and seeds that thrive when planted now:

Native Seeds

Wildflowers:

- California Poppy (*Eschscholzia californica*) The state flower, perfect for adding golden blooms to your landscape.
- Lupines (Lupinus spp.) Vibrant purple-blue spikes that attract pollinators.
- Clarkia (Clarkia amoena) Also known as Farewell-to-Spring, these delicate pink and purple flowers are easy to grow.
- Tidy Tips (*Layia platyglossa*) Cheerful yellow-and-white flowers ideal for meadow gardens.
- Gilia (Gilia spp.) Delicate, drought-tolerant blooms in soft blues and purples.

Grasses:

- Purple Needlegrass (*Stipa pulchra*) California's state grass, great for erosion control and habitat.
- California Fescue (Festuca californica) A lush bunchgrass that thrives in part shade.

Native Plants

Perennials and Shrubs:

- California Sagebrush (Artemisia californica) A fragrant, drought-tolerant shrub that supports local wildlife.
- Cleveland Sage (Salvia clevelandii) A fragrant sage with striking blue blooms that attract pollinators.
- Toyon (Heteromeles arbutifolia) Known as Christmas berry, this shrub

produces bright red berries in winter.

- Manzanita (Arctostaphylos spp.) Beautiful evergreen shrubs with smooth bark and pink flowers.
- Monkeyflower (*Diplacus aurantiacus*) A versatile plant with orange, yellow, or red blooms.
- California Buckwheat (*Eriogonum fasciculatum*) An essential nectar plant for pollinators and a lovely groundcover.

Groundcovers:

- **Douglas' Meadowfoam (***Limnanthes douglasii***)** A low-growing plant with charming white-and-yellow blooms.
- Beach Strawberry (*Fragaria chiloensis*) A native groundcover with small white flowers and edible fruit.

Tips for Success

- 1. **Prepare the Soil**: Clear weeds and loosen the soil for planting. Native plants thrive in well-drained soil. Its useful to add 6 inches of mulch 6 weeks prior to planting Native plants
- 2. Watering: Water seeds and young plants immediately after planting for 7 days. Rely on natural rainfall but supplement as needed until established.
- 3. **Mulch**: Use 4-6 inches mulch to retain moisture and reduce competition from weeds. Avoid placing mulch directly against plant stems.
- 4. **Spacing**: Give plants enough space to grow; native plants often spread out as they mature.


